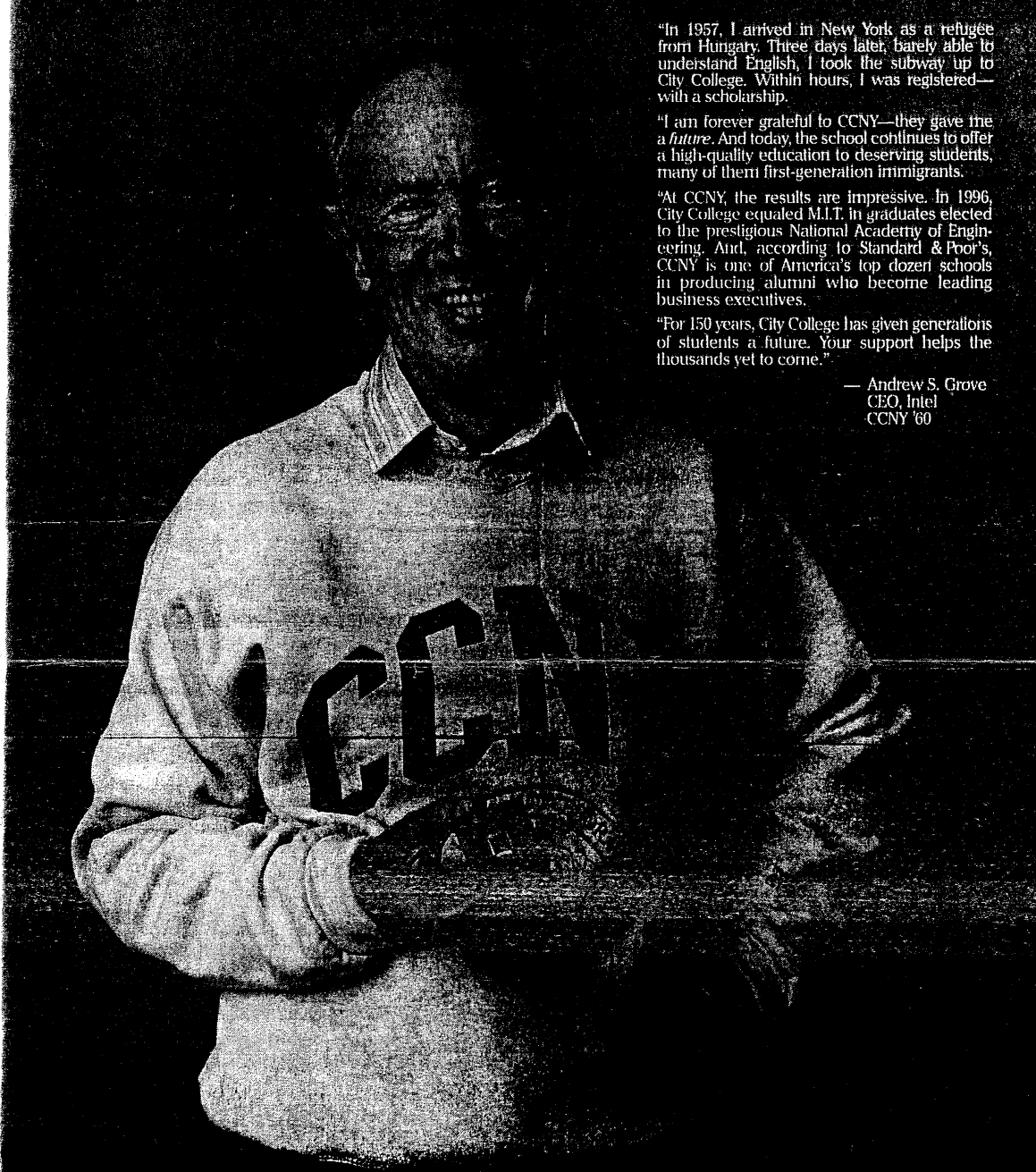


Computers rely on great chips. Cities rely on great people.
